

At Hawai'i Pacific Health, we offer high-quality cancer care in more locations than anyone else in Hawai'i. Our family of cancer centers is dedicated to providing care that is comprehensive, well-coordinated and connected. While we provide exceptional care on the campuses of our four medical centers (Straub Cancer Center, Kapi'olani Medical Center for Women & Children, Pali Momi Medical Center, and Wilcox Medical Center) each year, our experts go beyond our walls and provide a Free Cancer Community Event.

In 2017, our event was attended by a total of 680 people (573 Ala Moana, 72 PMMC, and 35 WMC). This year, we covered a range of topics and our participants provided us with exceptional feedback, noting the top two things learned were related to HPV testing and Caregiver Support.

Top five questions demonstrating most improvement:

1. What is the best test to determine ovarian reserve?
 - 12% increased to 83%
2. The human papillomavirus (HPV) is associated with what kind of cancer (s)?
 - 38% increased to 69%
3. Who should receive the HPV Vaccine?
 - 64% increased to 91%
4. What is the approach to preserve fertility in a patient anticipating gonadotoxic chemotherapy?
 - 31% increased to 57%
5. How many shots should someone receive of the HPV vaccine?
 - 34% increased to 56%

Top five questions answered correctly, post-conference:

1. Who should receive the HPV Vaccine?
2. What is the best test to determine ovarian reserve?
3. A reason to pursue treatment on the US mainland may be:
4. A cancer diagnosis is best treated on the US mainland T/F
5. Why do adolescents and young adults need their own cancer program?

In addition, following the conference, our providers performed 82 screenings for Head and Neck and Skin Cancer on-site (35 Head&Neck, 47 Skin). We had many positive findings that required follow up (12) and 1 basal cell cancer.
